## The 2016 Le Chéile Conference

This year's Le Chéile Conference generated a high level of engagement and thoughtful reflection. The variety and content of the workshops were appreciated with many requests that we return to and further develop some of the topics raised over the two days.

We had the largest student contingent ever this year and hopefully they will engage with their school Anam Caras to develop the Le Chéile *Pay It Forward Day* in their schools. We appreciated all the contributions and feedback from our participants as we continue to develop this important event for our Le Chéile Community.

Among the many significant contributions was that of Fr. Peter Mc Verry. His starting point was that when young people tell him they don't believe in God, he asks them to tell him about the God they don't believe in. He usually ends up telling them that he doesn't believe in that God - a censorious, judgemental God. The God he believes in is a God of mercy and compassion, who is tolerant of our weaknesses and forgiving of our offences. How we understand God determines how we understand what God wants, and therefore it influences our attitudes, priorities and behaviour.

To grow into the image and likeness of the God of compassion, we have to become the compassion of God to others. The God of compassion is 'good news to the poor'. However it is far more threatening to the lifestyle and securities of those of us who are not poor than the God whose passion is the observance of the law.

The early Christian community understood that this radical inclusiveness, revealed by the actions of Jesus had implications for their community and life together. In their community, no-one was to be unwanted, rejected or marginalised. Everyone had the same dignity of being a child of God and that dignity was to be recognised and affirmed by the way in which the Christian community reached out to them and accepted them.

Fr. Peter concluded with a challenge to us all: 'If we do not care and share, if we do not reach out, then there is no hope, and we will have destroyed, yet again, God's dream for our world. A community where everyone's needs are met through the caring and sharing of each one in the

community, where everyone feels loved, valued and respected, would surely be the Kingdom of God on

As we face the daily challenges in our schools and the greater external challenges of the changing social, economic and political landscape around us, hopefully we will remember Fr. Peter's challenge to continue to care, share and reach out in hope to contribute to God's dream for our world.

#### Seasonal Reflection



On Good Friday we are asked, 'Were you there when they crucified my Lord?' It is an uncomfortable question and one most of us would rather avoid. Jesus died and is buried and all is apparently over. We recall the Lord going forth to sacrifice so that we too may win the laughter of Easter Day.

On Easter Sunday we marvel at the miraculous. The crucified Jesus has unexpectedly become the risen Christ. The eternal has invaded the transient.

The Jesus of Good Friday has shown once and for all that God's relationship with each of us transcends the limitations of this life. Lent is a time of waiting, not for Godot, but for God.

It is ultimately not about our experience but about Jesus opening up a way for us through the very powers that would otherwise destroy us. It evokes a faithful waiting on God in the darkness of faith and invites a spirituality of silence.

Only in silence and contemplation can we allow God to reveal the divine greatness to us. During Lent we are given the breathing space to prepare for the real presence. It is a gentle call to slow down and reflect on the bigger picture.

Who is the God of the Paschal Mystery for us today?

The God of the Easter story is an impatient figure, hungry to transform us into worthy bearers of the name 'Christian'.

Jesus came on earth to love and be loved. The Christian life is an exchange of love - the love we receive and the love we give for Christ.

Lent is a welcome opportunity to savour the energy, joy, and trust of the unique Easter laughter.

It is a time when we are particularly conscious of the wisdom of Brendan Kennelly's incisive words,

'Self knows that self is not enough.'

# Le Chéile Schools Teachers' Retreat Day 6<sup>th</sup> February

"Be still and know that I am God" was the theme for the retreat and it was an opportunity to do just that. It was what the group participating in the day agreed that they wanted from the experience. It was a joy to welcome Fr. Donal Neary SJ as the facilitator. For some of us (myself included) the prospect of spending the day with Donal was enough of a draw as he brought back wonderful memories of 'Mater Dei' days.

As we all are so acutely conscious of these days, very few people in society can find adequate time to be still in their day. 'Mindfulness' has become the buzz word. But where did this practice come from? Not from 'eastern' traditions as many believe, but from our own Christian contemplative traditions; traditions dating back to the early Christian monasteries in our own isle. And so the day began with contemplation on gratitude, a very useful mindful practice, a wonderful way to be conscious of the grace of God in our own lives. In times of stress or difficulty a sense of being grateful or thankful for the good in our life can bring us energy, can help us through the darker times. Fr Donal spoke of the nature that was beginning to be reborn all around us and how the consciousness of God's gift of nature brings humility to our lives. We were invited to spend some time on our own, in thought and prayer, around these issues. During this time participants explored the natural surroundings of the retreat centre, noticing nature as it sprang forth, some doodled or made drawings, while others quietly reflected and prayed in the chapel. It was a lovely time. The group followed this with a very honest, thought-provoking and valuable discussion that brought important issues to the forefront of our minds.


Chaplains also gathered for their own lovely day of sharing and reflection with Brian Grogan S.J. and John Scally and we look to forward to this annual event.


