## The Catholic School—a Creative Dialogic Community

What is different and distinct about the Catholic school is the synergy that connects together all the elements that make up a school: people, building, educational purpose, history, values and culture. This synergy lies in the belief and knowledge that each human being is a child of God and is loved unconditionally from the beginning of time. This belief is pivotal to its vision and mission. The Catholic school works by navigating between the world of the twenty-first century and the world of the divine. It is in dialogue with God and with each other. What comes up from the middle of this encounter is a way of living expressed through and in its ethos. It recognises that this middle pathway has been forged by the person of Jesus Christ and it looks to his actions and values, outlined in the Gospel, to assist with living this way of life. It draws on and is inspired by the lives and heritage of others such as its founder who responded to God’s call in their lives. The Catholic school has a particular language to explain this realm of mystery to which it belongs and it uses signs and symbols to assist its understanding. It celebrates through religious ritual, the high and low moments of the school year, and follows the Catholic calendar of religious events. The Catholic school is centrally focussed on the community of all who belong in the school. It is relational, dialogical and receptive. It offers the educational platform for students to answer questions about meaning and life. It is committed to creating a space of inclusivity, equality and openness, where people can live with and be taught by one another, however diverse such people might be. It asks that each person would grow in the goodness of their humanity through their connection, care and compassion for each other and the world. It calls the community to respond responsibly to the world and the call of society. It strives for justice and fairness in all its interactions because each and every one deserves this as a child of God. It offers hope and affirmation of life because it believes that there is a God who is working within and at the heart of life. The Catholic school therefore sees education as a creative act of God, an act worked through and within the school.

The weeks before Easter are consumed by orals and practical work but there is also an urgency about how time is running out and the end of the school year is nigh. Amidst the hum drum of this world lie moments of extraordinariness. Within the ordinary moments of school life, there can be glimpsed moments of Resurrection. Moments in the classroom or in the school where you have been uplifted and moved to a whole different dimension – beyond space and time. These are moments perhaps when the whole class are so engaged with what is being offered that time is forgotten and the bell becomes a nuisance which calls us back to reality. Or perhaps a moment when a student makes a jump or connection in their learning and you are there to witness it. There are many, many such amazing moments. These moments move us beyond time and space into eternity. The Resurrection of Christ assured us that death has been conquered. Time is no longer supreme. Within the ordinary there is evidence of this extraordinary event. Dermot Lane, an Irish theologian, reminds us, that the problem we often have is that we have the experience of the extraordinary but miss the meaning. This Easter, the search lies not in an egg hunt but for the extraordinary in our lives – glimpses of Resurrection, glimpses of eternity.

Congratulations to the seventy-eight participants who completed the Middle Leaders courses in Dublin and Cavan this year. Pictured (right) is the final evening at the Dublin venue. Once again we would like to thank our school leadership teams who facilitated their staffs participation, projects and who attended the evening. Schools first submit **their Expression of Interest by 15<sup>th</sup> May by e-mail** to a dedicated e-mail address **Artcompetition@lecheiletrust.ie**. Schools then send an Entry Form and a photograph of each submission to the above e-mail address **by 6<sup>th</sup> September**.

Submissions for the final are selected from each Cluster. **Further Information will be available on [www.lecheile10.com](http://www.lecheile10.com)** including: Registration of Interest Form, Entry Form, The Rationale, Guidelines for entry and Judging Criteria. Students attend a curating workshop and arrange their piece for adjudication and exhibition on 5<sup>th</sup> October at the Education Conference in L.C.S.S.T. Dublin. The Exhibition will be open for viewing for a short time before the Prize giving ceremony.


### St Laurence College Loughlinstown (Marianist)
