

Catholic Schools Partnership Prayer Resource for Boards of Management/Governors

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Introduction

At the heart of its endeavour, Catholic education is an invitation to flourish by experiencing the world through the spectrum of faith. This means fostering habits and practices that encourage a personal relationship with Jesus, thereby continuing His ministry in the world. This mandate is at the centre of the work of boards of management/governors as they seek to ensure that schools are serving those in their care.

The impulse to assemble a prayer resource for use by boards came from a desire to support their members at the start of meetings as they focus on the centrality of the faith journey that is integral to the well-being of the whole school community. As the agendas of such meetings have lengthened exponentially with the burden of business that school management brings to a board for consideration, it is the hope of the Catholic Schools Partnership that the material in these pages will stir a re-engagement with the founding faith mission of the schools they safeguard.

As the physical presence of the founding diocese, religious orders and congregations has largely disappeared from classrooms and corridors, chairpersons and principals have now become the torchbearers of our faith tradition, and must proclaim the vision themselves. The challenge for many of us can be too little confidence – or too much self-consciousness – in articulating the language of faith.

These short pieces of scripture and prayer represent an invitation to board members to take time out from wherever they have come from in the intricacy of their own lives, so that the Gospel values of the Word can become fresh and refreshing again as they start to consider their order of business. We have provided a choice of three prayers for each month, from August to June, with a selection of additional prayers for circumstances that might arise in the course of the life of a board. As every school has its own particular context, these resources are designed to be adapted and used flexibly, in whole or in part, as required. They can be led by the chairperson, the principal, or shared among other board members – whatever suits those present. They can also be adapted for use at regional educational meetings.

The compilation of this resource, an initiative of the Catholic Schools Partnership, funded by the Catholic Education Service, is the product of a collaborative engagement with Ann O'Donoghue IBVM (Association of Patrons and Trustees of Catholic Schools), Justin Harkin and Jonathan Tiernan, members of CSP. All members of the team worked relentlessly in the interests of producing this collection of prayers.



Reading John 15:1–5

You are clean already, by means of the word that I have spoken to you. Remain in me, as I in you. As a branch cannot bear fruit all by itself, unless it remains part of the vine, neither can you unless you remain in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me, with me in him, bears fruit in plenty; for cut off from me you can do nothing.

Intercessions

Lord, you are the vine, we are the branches. Help us to remember at all times that you are with us. With your help and light within us, may we serve our school community to the best of our abilities. We pray for those who have been sick or had illhealth over the summer. We remember all who have been bereaved recently, especially ... *Lord, hear our prayer*.

Christ you have reminded us that you are the vine, we the branches, help us to remember you are: with us before us, behind us, in us, all round us, in all those we think of, meet, see and hear, listen to. now and each day. May we be open to being influenced by one another in your name, through Christ our Lord.

Reading Peter 4:10–11

Each one of you has received a special grace, so, like good stewards responsible for all these different graces of God, put yourselves at the service of others. If you are a speaker, speak in words which seem to come from God; if you are a helper, help as though every action was done at God's orders; so that in everything God may receive the glory, through Jesus Christ, since to him alone belong all glory and power for ever and ever. Amen.

Reflection

Our coming together demonstrates our commitment to our school community as a place of teaching and learning, of unity and diversity. It also marks an important moment of preparation for the new school year. We know from experience that our work is a work of service that can be both invigorating and challenging. We come to it wearing different hats, each charged with enriching our discussions and deliberations with the insights and wisdom we have accrued. More than that, according to our reading, we come to it as people gifted by God with graces oriented to the benefit of all the communities we serve.

This evening, let us take a moment to acknowledge the diversity of our unity and the tremendous potential it contains. May the Lord support us to recognise and create space for each other's viewpoints and competencies, that as we undertake the business of our meetings, we may grow in faith, hope and love.

Closing Prayer

Let your blessing come down upon us, Lord, that our time together will be fruitful for our school community

and, in the words of St Peter, that in everything You may receive the glory, through Jesus Christ, since to Him alone belong all glory and power.





As we gather together to begin a new school year, let us take a few moments in prayer to nourish us for the work that lies ahead.

Opening Prayer

Let us pray, God of wisdom and understanding, Guide us in our work this year. Send the Holy Spirit to sustain us, Strengthen us, and nourish us as we seek to serve our school. Through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

Reading Luke 6:36–38

Jesus said to the disciples, 'Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful. Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven; give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back.'

The Word of the Lord.

Reflection

As we begin this new school year this reading from Luke provides us with clear signposts to guide our deliberations and decision-making. Jesus reminds us to be merciful and we pray for the gift of mercy in a particular way when thinking about those who will be most affected by the decisions we take throughout the year. Jesus said that 'the measure you give will be the measure you get back'. We now reflect silently in the stillness of our hearts on the following question:

What commitment do we give this year, as a board of management/governors to ensure that we serve our school and students as effectively as we can?

Closing Prayer

As we begin our first meeting of the new school year we invoke the blessing of our Heavenly Father as we pray:

Our Father who art in heaven ...

I would like to welcome you all to our first meeting of the new school year. Saint Mother Teresa of Kolkata tells us, 'In life we cannot always do great things, but we can do small things with great love.'

Opening Prayer

We thank God for the skills, talents and service that all present bring to our school community. Lord, on our journey of new beginnings, we ask that your guiding hand enables us to show courage and wisdom as we watch over our school.

Reading

Mark 4:30–32

Jesus said, 'With what can we compare the Kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it?'

It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground is the smallest of all the seeds of the earth, yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade.

The Word of the Lord.

Reflection

Let us pause for a moment to reflect on this reading.

The Gospel values which underpin our school community enable us as leaders to assist our teachers, chaplains and parents, to raise our students to have a spiritual, moral and ethical compass to guide them through their lives. We hope too that the life and mission of Jesus will touch them on their journey at this time.

As board members, we must embrace our duty to be the custodians of the mustard seeds that are our students. We must strive to facilitate the nurturing, guidance and care that will be needed for them to go forward to be the great shrub whose branches offer shelter, hope, tolerance and peace to whatever society they live in as adults.

We ask, Lord, that you guide us in this work. Amen.

Closing Prayer

Behind you all your memories, Before you all your dreams Around you all who love you, within you all you need. Father in Heaven bless us and Keep us safe on this journey of New Beginnings.

Amen.

As we gather at the start of a new school year let us take a moment to remember and renew our vision for Catholic education.

Opening Prayer

Holy Spirit, inspire us and renew us as we embark upon a new school year. Spark our imaginations, fill us with desire to enhance the lives of our students, and help us to be grateful for the privilege of being involved in leadership roles in education.

Reading 1 Thessalonians 1:4–7

We know, brothers and sisters, that God loves you and that you have been chosen, because when we brought the Good News to you, it came to you not only as words, but as power and as the Holy Spirit and as utter conviction. And you observed the sort of life we lived when we were with you, which was for your instruction, and you were led to become imitators of us, and of the Lord; and it was with the joy of the Holy Spirit that you took to the Gospel, in spite of the great opposition all around you. This has made you the great example to all believers.

The Word of the Lord.

Intercessions

You desire our well-being, Lord. Renew our faith, hope and love that we may hear and embrace your word to each of us at this time. *Lord hear us.* Bless our school community as we embark on another school year. *Lord hear us*.

Lord, help us to be infused with enthusiasm, optimism and imagination. *Lord hear us.*

Lord, help us to be kind and understanding towards the people we engage with in the coming school year. *Lord hear us.*


Lord, help us to keep a positive attitude despite the challenges we will inevitably face. *Lord hear us.*

A moment of silence for participants to place personal or private intentions before the Lord.

Closing Prayer

Lord, we know that our role in educating young people is a huge privilege. We hope we will always keep this in mind. Help us to be pure in spirit and genuine in all that we do in the service of our school community.





You are all welcome to this, our October Meeting. As we near the end of our busy day let us take a moment together to pause and begin with prayer.

Opening Prayer

Lord, heal us of our doubts and fears, our cynicism and despair, so that we may always believe in your loving and saving presence in our midst in every time, in every place.

Reading Matthew 10:5–12

These Twelve Jesus sent out with the following instructions: 'Go nowhere among the Gentiles, and enter no town of the Samaritans, but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. As you go, proclaim the good news, "The Kingdom of Heaven has come near." Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers and cast out demons. You received without payment; give without payment. Take no gold, or silver or copper in your belts, no bag for your journey or two tunics or sandals or staff; for labourers deserve their food. Whatever town or village you enter, find out who in it is worthy, and stay there until you leave.'

The Word of the Lord.

Reflection

Like the disciples we are all called by Jesus to go forth and share the Good News of justice, peace and love.

Let us pause to give thanks for all those whose involvement in our school, our parish and wider society supports the many initiatives that our pupils are involved in that empower them to serve their community and grow in an understanding of the world around them. Education through service to others is one of the core messages of our schools and serves as a beautiful witness to the transformational power of the Gospel message.

Closing Prayer

God of abundant harvests, transform our hearts to be sources of the seeds of peace, compassion, healing and justice. Be with us and guide us always.

October each year is the month that the Church dedicates to Mission. As we begin our meeting, let us take a little time to reflect on our mission as the board of management/governors in supporting and developing the mission of the school.

Opening Prayer

Lord, much of what we're doing is humdrum. Make it matter. Let our session stand its ground for the good of all. Remind us of your loving kindness Before we begin our business.

Amen.

Reading Matthew 18:1–5, 10

At this time the disciples came to Jesus and said, 'Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?' So he called a little child to him and set the child in front of them. Then he said, 'I tell you solemnly, unless you change and become like little children you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. And so, the one who makes himself as little as this little child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. 'Anyone who welcomes a little child like this in my name welcomes me ... See that you never despise any of these little ones, for I tell you that their angels in heaven are continually in the presence of my Father in heaven.'

The Word of the Lord.

Reflection

Pope Francis reflects the spirit of this passage when he tells us, 'When we are before a child, although we have many problems and many difficulties, a smile comes to us from within, because we see hope in front of us: a child is hope. And in this way, we must be able to discern in life the way of hope, which leads us to find God, God who became a child for us.'

We ask for the grace to experience the love of Jesus in the unconditional way in which a child loves its parents.

We pray for the gift of hope, especially for those among us who are dispirited, grieving or forlorn. May the spirit of the Lord help us all to smile like a child.

May our work as a board be a source of hope to this school community.

Closing Prayer

God our Father, we pray that all our students, staff and parents may feel included, safe and cared for within our school community. We make these and all the prayers of our hearts through Christ our Lord.

The school year is now up and running. We have had successes and, despite challenges, hopefully the seeds of our enthusiasm is still intact. Let us build on the good will of the whole school community.

Opening Prayer

Lord, we may not have made the perfect start to the new school year, but we hope and pray we have done our best. Thank you for your blessing and we are sorry for the times we have fallen short of our vision.

Reading

Matthew 13:1–9

That same day, Jesus left the house and sat by the lakeside, but such crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there. He said, 'Imagine a sower going out to sow. As he sowed, some seeds fell on the edge of the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Others fell on patches of rock where they found little soil and sprang up straight away, because there was no depth of earth; but as soon as the sun came up they were scorched and, not having any roots, they withered away. Others fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Others fell on rich soil and produced their crop, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Listen, anyone who has ears!'

The Word of the Lord.

Reflection

It can be easier at some times than at others to start the new school year with enthusiasm and the freshness of a new beginning. Lord, at this time of year when we consider harvest themes, let the seeds of education that we sow bear fruit in many surprising ways in the hearts and souls of our students. Help us to be compassionate and effective in our valuable work.

Closing Prayer

For all this, in Your name, we pray: Our Father who art in heaven ...





You are all welcome to our November meeting. Thank you for being here again to share your wisdom and insights. At this time of year we remember those who have gone before us, who have left a mark on our lives. Perhaps we could take a few moments in our reflection this evening to remember them.

Opening Prayer

Lord Jesus You are a God of love and peace. Grant peace to those who have gone before us. Open our minds and guide our hearts, Help us to grow in knowledge of you.

Amen.

Reading Ecclesiasticus 44:1–15

Let us praise illustrious people, Our ancestors in their successive generations. Their good works have not been forgotten. In their descendants there remains, a rich inheritance born of them. Their bodies have been buried in peace, And their name lives on for all generations. The peoples will proclaim their wisdom, The assembly will celebrate their praises.

The Word of the Lord.

Reflection

During the month of November we remember those who have gone before us marked with the sign of faith. We are encouraged to pray for our family and friends, our ancestors, and for those who may have no one to pray for them. This unifies us as a Christian family, connecting earth and heaven.

Let us remember someone who has influenced us from our past, our school days, a teacher, a school friend.

Reflect quietly for a few moments, thanking God for that person.

We pray that through our work as a board we may be inspired by their wisdom and courage, so that all our work tonight is for the greater glory of God.

Closing Prayer

Let us end with the prayer of St John Henry Newman:

May He support us all the day long Till the shades lengthen and the evening comes, and the busy world is hushed, and the fever of life is over

and our work is done.

Then in his mercy may He give us a safe lodging, a holy rest, and peace at the last.

As we gather this evening, I am conscious that we are all coming from different places in a busy world. Thank you for being here and for your commitment to this board. In this month of the Holy Souls, let us also keep in mind and remember all those who have gone before us.

Opening Prayer

Lord Jesus As we gather here this evening we pray for light and guidance, so that all in this school community may benefit from our work and decision-making.

Amen.

Reading Matthew 5:13

Jesus said 'You are the light of the world. A city built on a hilltop cannot be hidden. No one lights a lamp to put it under a tub. They put it on a lamp-stand, where it shines for everyone in the house. In the same way your light must shine before all people, so that, seeing your good works, they may give the praise to your Father in heaven.'

The Word of the Lord.

Reflection

Let us reflect for a few moments in silence on the words of Jesus in the Gospel of St Matthew.

What light can I bring to this meeting?

How can I shine a light for good on decisions being made that will impact the lives of all those in this school community?

Intercessions

Lord, give us the courage to share truth and wisdom at this meeting. Lord hear us.

Lord, enlighten our minds and hearts through the power of your Holy Spirit. *Lord hear us.*

Lord, may all our work tonight give praise to your Father in heaven. *Lord hear us*.

Lord, grant healing to the sick and those in distress. Lord hear us.

Lord, give eternal rest to all those who have died. We remember especially all those associated with this school community. May they enjoy eternal happiness with You forever. Lord hear us.

Closing Prayer

God our Father, Be a bright flame before me, a guiding star above me. Be a smooth path below me, a kindly shepherd behind me, Now and forever.

As we gather this evening, during the month of the Holy Souls, let us remember those who have gone before us and in particular all those associated with this school community.

Opening Prayer

Gracious God We gather as your faithful people. Send your Spirit of wisdom upon us, so that our hearts and minds may be open to all that is shared and discussed throughout this meeting. Through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

Reading Isaiah 43:1–2, 4

Thus says the Lord, who created you, 'Do not be afraid for I have redeemed you, I have called you by your name, you are mine. You are precious in my eyes, You are honoured and I love you. Do not be afraid for I am with you.'

The Word of the Lord.

Let us take a moment to reflect on the words we have just heard.

Intercessions

We pray for those who inspired and influenced our lives. Lord, grant them rest. *Lord hear us.*

Let us remember those in our school community who are sick. Lord, sustain them. *Lord hear us*.

For all those in exam years, that they may not grow weary or be stressed. Lord hear us.

For teachers everywhere, may they be beacons of light to all those in their care. Lord hear us.

Closing Prayer

Lord, we thank you for all those who now share eternal glory with you, particularly those we have known and loved. Grant them the rest and peace they deserve. As we begin our meeting may we be mindful of their legacy and the good they have done. Grant us wisdom and courage to make wise decisions. We make our prayer to you through the intercession of Mary.





Before we proceed with the business of our meeting let us open our hearts and minds to God as he speaks to us in prayer.

Opening Prayer

Lord, in the quiet of Advent, we prepare our hearts.

- May we be inspired and moved by your spirit in all our decisions and discussions together.
- As we await the coming of your son, we pray that we be Christ-like, that our thoughts, words and deeds may glorify your name.

Amen.

Reading Corinthians 4:1–2, 5

Brothers and sisters:

People must think of us as Christ's servants, stewards entrusted with the mysteries of God.
What is expected of stewards is that each one should be found worthy of his trust.
There must be no passing of premature judgement.
Leave that until the Lord comes;
he will light up all that is hidden in the dark and reveal the secret intentions of men's hearts.
Then will be the time for each one to have whatever praise he deserves, from God.

The Word of the Lord.

Reflection

In this passage, St Paul mentions how we should be regarded in our lives – as servants of Christ. Our work in schools as elsewhere, particularly in this season, can be busy and relentless. We can easily become consumed by the hustle and bustle. How are we demonstrating the Christ-like servant leadership and management that we are called to? In what ways can we make Christ's love evident in our vocation as leaders and management?

This season offers us the opportunity to focus on our capacity to be Christ-like instead of servants to the money, wealth, power, overindulgence, and so on, and to support and lead the faith development of the school community.

Closing Prayer

God our Father, through this Advent season, we are inclined to hurry through our days, preparing for Christmas in our homes and schools – forgetting to prepare our hearts too. Teach us to wait patiently, taking time to pause, to restore ourselves in quiet and prayer. Teach us to open our hearts to your voice, waiting for your word that we may meaningfully welcome your coming into our lives.

As we begin our December meeting, we give thanks for the many blessings that have been bestowed on this school community. Throughout this meeting may we continue to reflect a spirit of kindness and compassion.

Opening Prayer

Lord Jesus Christ, you are the Word made flesh, the communication of God's love for the world. Be with us as we begin our meeting, that our words and ideas come through clearly and reflect your truth.

Reading Isaiah 9:5

For there is a child born for us, a son given to us and dominion is laid on his shoulders; and this is the name they give him: Wonder-Counsellor, Mighty-God, Eternal-Father, Prince-of-Peace.

The Word of the Lord.

Intercessions

Lord, we pray for our school community: That we not only talk about you, but make you present in our classrooms; not only encourage faith, hope, and love, but embody those virtues in our students.

Lord hear us.

Lord, we pray that you might help us respond to the needs of others. *Lord hear us.*

We pray for the vulnerable who have no place to call their own. Let your blessings be with all who work to help those most in need this Christmas, and inspire us with courage to do the same. *Lord hear us.*

This season of Advent reminds us that your grace continues to break forth into our world and into our lives. Grant that we might recognise your work and invitations during this season. Lord hear us.

Closing Prayer

Lord,

We actively seek you in our lives and welcome you among us this Advent season. May we reach out to others in a meaningful and Christ-like way. Through Christ our Lord.

As we begin our meeting, let us take a moment to become present to ourselves and to invoke God's blessing on our time together.

A brief period of silence follows.

Opening Prayer

Father in heaven,

We turn to you during this busy month calling to mind the birth of your Son Bless our time together, that our hearts may be open to your spirit of love. Through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

Reading 1 Thessalonians 5:23–24

May the God who gives us peace make you completely his, and keep your whole being, spirit, soul, and body, free from all fault, at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. He who calls you will do it, for he is faithful.

The Word of the Lord.

Intercessions

You desire our well-being Lord. Renew our faith, hope and love that we may hear and embrace your word to each of us at this time. *Lord hear us*. Bless our school community. May every member experience the gift of your peace this Advent and Christmas season. *Lord hear us.*

Bless the efforts of our students, staff, RE team and chaplain who give expression to your love through our Advent and Christmas celebrations. *Lord hear us.*

Bless all who are unwell in mind, body and spirit at this time. Bless too those who mourn and grieve. May they experience your healing and consolation. *Lord hear us*.

A moment of silence for participants to place personal or private intentions before the Lord.

Closing Prayer

Heavenly Father, Thank you for the human birth of your only begotten son. Number all members of our school community among His people, for He is our the salvation. Through the same Christ, our Lord.





As we gather after the great celebration of Christmas may the joy of that season continue to feed us in the term ahead.

Opening Prayer
