




SRC 2021-2022

SURVIVING 5th Year





VISIT of WRITER, ANN MURTAGH TO ST LOUIS HIGH SCHOOL

On 28th April, Ann Murtagh, an Irish author, was invited to come to our school to talk to Ms. Muldoon's 5th year English class about writing historical fiction. She was invited in, and very generously accepted the invitation to teach us some skills and tips she had learned and picked up while writing her novels. Ann Murtagh has written three novels, two have been published, *The Sound of Freedom* and *The Kids of Summerhill*, and one is set to be published in March of next year.

The Sound of Freedom is set in 1919 in County Westmeath, during the Irish War of Independence and focuses on a young boy called Colm who aspires to join the local volunteers and dreams of an Independent Ireland. *The Kids of Summerhill* centres around four kids who live in the Dublin tenements in 1945, and whose mother has just passed and are left to fend for themselves.

Something that Ann focused on during her time speaking with us was where she got her inspiration from and how she used this to create a story. She talked about the value of primary sources in order to spark ideas and build your world accurately. She often researches to find things like newspapers, witness statements and censuses from the times and events that she wants to explore. These have significance because they are first-hand accounts of people's reactions and experiences during that time period.

Ann Murtagh's talk was an interesting view into the life of a writer. Our class learned a lot about how to write a story based in a time that you do not know much about. There was a very positive reaction and consensus during and after Ann Murtagh had come in to speak to us. There was great engagement, with lots asking questions about her process of writing and how other places and people can inspire her to write a story. Many of my classmates benefitted from listening to Ann Murtagh explain how world-building is so important for creative writing.

Leaving Certificate students

We wish our Leaving Certificate and Junior Cycle students every success in their examinations. Many Leaving Certificate students already have provisional offers for their course of choice and look forward to furthering their studies next year. Most of our students will have to wait until CAO offers have been made before decisions are finalised.

Don't forget, you have until July 1st at 5.00pm to change your mind about your order of preference. However, we caution against making any drastic changes at such a late stage. A deliberate and balanced approach to the order of preference list on the CAO has been taken all year, both in guidance classes and at the sixth years' individual meetings with their guidance counsellor. Ms Farragher will be available on the day of the Leaving Certificate results, as well as during the crucial CAO offers stage for any help, support and guidance needed.

Career Related Information for Students and Parents

We would like to remind parents to regularly check the Guidance and Counselling section of the school website. It provides very useful information as well as details of the many opportunities available to your daughters. A number of our Transition Year and 5th Year students have signed up for the UCD and Maynooth summer school which will take place this month. This affords our students a fantastic opportunity to sample subjects available at degree level, well in advance of decision-making time in 6th year.

The Guidance website provides information about further opportunities for which there are still places available. Such opportunities include a camp in app-building/coding, portfolio courses in NCAD and a summer school in DCU to learn Chinese. Promoting Positive Mental Health

Managing device usage

Increasingly each year, we hear from students and their parents/guardians about excessive time spent on social media. SPHE teachers have learned from students in class discussions that screen times can exceed four/five hours each day, which is extremely worrying. Many parents have commented to us those multiple notifications arrive onto their child's phone from friends/contacts in the middle of the night. We are aware of the negative impact that this is having on the mental health and wellbeing of our young people. We see reduced concentration, sleepiness in class and, unfortunately heightened anxiety levels and low mood. Our teenagers need peaceful, uninterrupted sleep at night.

While there are many reasons for this increase in students' anxiety and low mood, we believe that there is a strong correlation between use of social media and these issues of concern. While it can be so difficult for parents/guardians to manage the use of social media with their children, we highly recommend that, at the very least, your children do not keep their device/s in their bedrooms overnight. This habit can be difficult to introduce. However, summer-time might offer a window to introduce this change for your child. We believe that this change would be beneficial for your daughters' physical and mental health.

Managing Anxiety Levels

We have purchased a 2.5 hour programme for parents/guardians to help manage anxiety levels with teenagers, as well as managing one's own anxiety levels.

This Programme Supports Parents to:

1. Understand anxiety as a normal response to danger and/or perceived danger;
2. Recognise the impact early childhood experiences and key developmental milestones can have;
3. Consider the impact of their own anxiety on themselves and their child;
4. Manage their child's anxiety through using key cognitive behavioural principles to acknowledge feelings, manage thoughts, challenge beliefs and focus particularly on helpful actions. 'Understanding and Managing Your Child's Anxiety' has evolved from Dr. Claire Hayes's combined thirty-eight years of training and experience as a clinical psychologist, lecturer, author and teacher as well as by her training with Professor Philip Kendall, Temple University. CREATIVE IRELAND PROGRAMME



The Creative Schools programme is an initiative of the Creative Ireland Programme run by the Arts Council and the Department of Education. “The Creative Schools initiative supports schools/centres to put the arts and creativity at the heart of children’s and young people’s lives. This initiative provides opportunities for children and young people to build their artistic and creative skills; to communicate, collaborate, stimulate their imaginations, be inventive, and to harness their curiosity. It will empower children and young people to develop, implement and evaluate arts and creative activity throughout their schools/centres and stimulate additional ways of working that reinforce the impact of creativity on children and young people’s learning, development and well-being.”

The Arts Council assigned a Creative Associate, Mirjam Keune to St Louis High School. The Creative Associate worked with the coordinator and the school on understanding creativity, planning a creative vision for the school and developing creative opportunities from this plan. Mirjam Keune is a visual artist. Her work includes mixed media and crafts. She has worked extensively in primary schools and also works with adults in Mental Health Services and adult education.

Creative workshops were held with 1st, 2nd, 3rd, TY and 5th year students and started with an informal discussion about creativity, followed by a hands-on creative workshop. A general survey on matters discussed by the students was shared with all students in the school.

Mirjam found the students very engaged and vocal and said that they were not afraid to speak their mind, listened to each other and came up with great ideas. Often a suggestion would be made, and students would start to brainstorm there and then. They were welcoming, curious, respectful and very open to share their own experiences.

As Mirjam outlined in her report: *‘I was approached by a group of 5th year students in the corridor, welcoming me as they thought I was a new teacher. A conversation about creativity started there and then. To see that kind of confidence and eloquence in students is a credit to the school. After my workshop with another group of 5th year students, two approached me afterwards saying that they would be very keen to share their creative knowledge with younger students. This willingness to share, to give up personal time and to work together I came across in all classes.’*

The plan for the future is to engage with the students, teaching staff, management and the wider school community on developing creative opportunities for the young people and the staff in the school. We are also hoping to create a Creative Collective with interested teachers.

There have already been some great opportunities for students to engage with the Creative Schools Programme this year. This academic year, Ms Kehoe (teacher) organised various creative activities and events. This included a whole-school bottle cap collection and mural on the art corridor organised by TY students and the Art and Performing/Creative Arts classes. Funding was awarded from the **Irish Hospice Foundation** for the **‘Reflections’** project. Ms Slattery and Ms Kehoe organised an origami crane project for all members of staff, linking in with Decorative Artist, Patricia O’Malley. Students from various year groups worked with Dublin street artist **DECOY** to create a beautiful mural beside the school’s Geodome. The ‘Reflections’ project culminated with a celebration of the arts, music, prayer and poetry for students and staff in March with our event **‘Cuimhní is Céiliúradh San Lughaidh’**. Other creative initiatives throughout the year, facilitated by staff, included a variety of workshops, such as drumming, poetry, creative writing and a school danceathon. St Louis High School Parents' Council (PC) 2021/22



As always, this year's Council was formed after the AGM in September. We were a good mix of new and continuing members. The main theme of the year was (slowly) re-building momentum after the pandemic. This started with all members contributing their ideas about what we might do. We agreed our overall objective is to support SLHS and its ethos, which we do through a combination of fundraising, making all parents feel welcome, involved and supported, providing input to the Board of Management, and promoting St Louis in the local community.

The new Council met over Zoom in September and November, and finally met in person outside the GeoDome in early December 2021. At this point much discussion was about possible fundraising activities to replace the Christmas Fair which was cancelled again last year. In May PC members participated in the open day for parents of incoming First Years, again building connections and, we hope, encouraging new parents to join the PC in the years to come.

Our January meeting was back on Zoom whereas we managed to meet face-to-face in March and May. The principal and a parent representative on the Board of Management attend PC meetings, which gives PC members the opportunity to input to wider topics that are important to the school. Over 2021/2 the PC was consulted about the school's new Mission Statement, the Strategic Development Plan, the uniform policy, the punctuality policy, child protection policies and procedures, the new timetable, and arrangements for meetings (information and parent-teacher meetings) in the 2022/3 school year (online/in-person).

The members of the PC have rich and diverse knowledge, perspectives and ideas, and are all willing to assist whenever an opportunity arises. There are enough of us that we can cover for each other's other commitments and still do what needs to be done. Introduction of new timetable structure for 2022-2023



Following consultation with students, staff, parents and the Board of Management, we have decided to trial the 58 min timetable structure next year. You will see below the layout of the school week for students. With the changes to the new Junior Cycle and also the introduction of new senior cycle curricula and specifications in the coming years, these longer class periods should afford more time and space to deepen the learning the experience for students and afford teachers time to fully embrace new teaching methodologies. As you will see from the timetable below, there will be 6 class periods in a day, Monday-Thursday and 5 periods on a Friday with an earlier finish. Having fewer periods in the day will mean that students will have fewer books to carry to school each day and should be able to better manage homework throughout the week. We also hope that this will help with the transition from primary into post-primary school for our new first years. The school building will be open from 8am for students. Students should be in school by 8.20am at the latest in order to be ready for class, which will commence at 8.30am.
