SRC 2022-2023

The Student Representative Council, more commonly known as the SRC, or to the student population as "your ones in green"!! is an important part of life in St. Louis High School. As head Girl, I have the great privilege of leading this team. Our role is to represent all the students in our school and to ensure that their voices are heard. It is our job to build the best possible relationship with our teachers and school leaders and together with them to build a school community where everyone is happy to learn and grow.

As well as our usual role representing different year groups and leading the elected class representatives, this year we have undertaken new roles to promote areas of school life that we value and want to promote. These include Arts and Culture, Environment, Friendship, Peer-Study Support and School Culture and Ethos. We will work together to promote these important areas of our school life.

The SRC has had a busy start to the school year working hard to ensure that every student in every year group felt welcomed and part of the St. Louis school community.

To help us prepare for our role as student leaders we participated in the St. Louis Network Student Leadership Induction Day, in which we learnt what makes a good leader, how to come together as a unit and how to put our ideas into action.

Once we were trained up, we began our job as student leaders by attending the assemblies for each year group. This was a wonderful opportunity for us to meet with the students and to introduce ourselves. We endeavoured to establish ourselves as the friendly face that can be approached by any student who may need a helping hand.

We were also part of the team, that helped to welcome our new first year students on their Induction Day. We planned games and icebreakers to help them get to know each other and to ease the transition between primary and secondary school. We also helped them with the practical business of being a first year; showing them around our sprawling school building and helping them to figure out how to use their lockers.

All students in St. Louis have the chance to put themselves forward to be part of the student leadership team. During the month of September, the SRC organised the election of class representatives. The class representatives work hard to represent their class liaising with their SRC and teachers about issues that may arise and organising class activities and events.

This year, the SRC together with the class representatives and the Green School's Committee are working hard to promote sustainability and environmental awareness. We are organising a number of events to try to raise awareness and to get the students thinking about ways to reduce, reuse and recycle. Together with the Global Schools and Green School's Committee we are organising a clothes exchange day for the students, where they can donate clothes they no longer use and buy clothes that have been donated.

Another area we are working to promote is Gender Equality. We are working with the St. Louis Network to promote the sustainable development goal SDG, number five, of Gender Equality. As an all-girls school, this is a goal that is close to our hearts. Throughout the year we will work to raise awareness in our school community of the many issues pertaining to gender equality. Last year's SRC began a project to bring awareness to the issue of period poverty and with sponsorship from local business provided period products in the students' bathrooms throughout the school. We are happy to continue with this project which has been received positively by the student body.

As well as these important school-wide initiatives, we have also been busy organising events that bring joy to our school days. Next week we will celebrate the end of term by running a Halloween-themed civvies day and bake sale for all the students. Funds raised by these activities will be donated to Women's Aid Ireland and The Merchant's Quay charities. There will be prizes for the best costume and the best baked goods.

We are especially looking forward to our annual First-year Halloween Dress-up Disco on Thursday 27th. We hope that this will be a fun way for first years to celebrate the end of their first term as St. Louis girls.

We hope that the work we have been doing has helped everyone to have a happy and productive first term in St. Louis High School. Happy mid-term.



Louis Literary 2022.







Recommended Reads


"The Thursday Murder Club" by Richard Osman

When a brutal killing takes place on their very doorstep, the Thursday Murder Club find themselves in the middle of their first live case. Elizabeth, Joyce, Ibrahim and Ron might be pushing eighty but they still have a few tricks up their sleeves.









"Small Things Like These" by Claire Keegan

It is 1985, in an Irish town. During the weeks leading up to Christmas, Bill Furlong, a coal and timber merchant, faces into his busiest season. As he does the rounds, he feels the past rising up to meet him — and encounters the complicit silences of a people controlled by the Church. Small Things Like These is an unforgettable story of hope, quiet heroism and tenderness.

"Agatha Christie" by Lucy Worsley

A fascinating account of the life of Agatha Christie from celebrated literary and cultural historian Lucy Worsley. Christie was born in 1890 into a world which had its own rules about what women could and couldn't do. This is the story of a person who, despite the obstacles of class and gender, became an astonishingly successful working woman.

"My Name is Lucy Barton" by Elizabeth Strout

Lucy Barton is recovering slowly from what should have been a simple operation, when her estranged mother comes to see her. This is a keenly observant, deeply human, and truly unforgettable tale.

A playlist of songs will be compiled, and students will be able to access this playlist on a QR code around the school.

We are planning a pop-up swap shop event in the new year. All students will be asked to bring in old clothes that will be collected in the foyer after midterm, in hopes to raise awareness of sustainability. This is in collaboration with the Green Committee.

Dance (Rep- Ms. West)

A dance workshop with Ms. West will take place for all the first years to get them moving and grooving.

To conclude, we are hoping that everyone will embrace the arts and take part in upcoming events.



GREEN SCHOOLS' COMMITTEE



On behalf of green schools, we would like to let you all know what we have done, what we are doing and what we plan to do in the future. We restarted green schools last year and so far, have made some progress. Last year it was harder as we were all still in covid times, however now we have started back up fully and have already made lots of progress such as getting recycling bins back in our school and being 1 of only 30 schools selected to take part in "lets fix fashion" campaign. We have many plans this year such as to get our global citizenship flag and our plans to do a swap shop and educate people on fast fashion. So far, this year has had a great start and we hope to keep it up for the rest of the year our main goal is to raise awareness and educate people on how to make greener decisions to help our earth and make our school a greener place!

On the topic of Recycling, one of the things we observed was that there was a lack of recycling bins in our school at the beginning of the year and were not being used correctly. For example, the green bins, which are the recycling bins, should only have things like plastic, paper, cardboard, etc but instead, there are food waste items in them.

We are doing a waste audit on Friday the 21st to get a better idea of the situation. We also want to educate people on what to put in bins we have both a TikTok and an Instagram account where we post videos on what to put in the bins.

We also noticed that there was a shortage of brown bins around the school and the gardening club are introducing composting in the first-year corridors to make it easier for people to dispose of their fruit waste.

The 'Let's fix fashion' competition, organised by Greens Schools is focused on recycling our old clothes, sharing clothes and even up-cycling clothes we have bought.

Most students have now watched short film "The true cost of Fashion", so we are building awareness of the damage that fast fashion does to our environment. We will be conducting a survey to see what and where people buy clothes and to help educate people on fast fashion!

After midterm will be preparing for our swap shop where students and teachers can bring in their old clothes and swap them with new clothes – all to help slow fast fashion. The swap shop will take place after Christmas break.

So that's what we have done and our some of our plans this year! As you can see, we have already gotten off to a great start and we cannot wait to see what happens in the future for green schools. We have meetings most Thursdays at lunchtime and are always welcoming new members. We hope that you enjoyed reading about green schools and think about making greener decisions in your daily life.



RDS World Skills Day - 14th September 2022

On the 14th of September, TYs enjoyed a day of exploring potential career options in the RDS for World Skills Day. Students spent the day visiting various workshops, talking to all sorts of people about a huge variety of jobs and training options. There were countless demonstrations of a broad range of practical jobs in action on display, from cooking and bricklaying to hairdressing and catering. Students were given the chance to roam around these, and to stop and learn more about any that interested them. Jobs that didn't require a demonstration, provided information about what they do, and how they came to do it, with some having models and examples of their work. A few of these included: graphic design, insurance, windmill development and computer programming. The people manning each workshop were extremely enthusiastic and helpful with your research about a certain career and, as well as providing information on the career itself, lent guidance on the steps you would have to take to reach it, such as what qualifications you would need. There was no end to the information that could be gained from the day, and many students left with handfuls of information-packed leaflets (as well as pockets full of free merchandise like keychains and tote bags) to look at later. There were even interactive aspects of some workshops, such as virtual reality headsets that illuminated the work a video game designer does, and free hairdos from the hairdressers to show the sheer amount of skill involved in hairdressing. All-round it was a very beneficial, enlightening and enjoyable day for TYs, and they gained a lot from it. It offered invaluable insight into potential future careers, possibly bringing clarity to some students as to whether they want to pursue a particular career or not, which is something that can be hard to figure out on your own or online.

Barista Workshop - 19th September 2022

The possibilities ranged from mochas to flat whites, though I had a mocha myself. They were delicious (and quite photogenic).
