#### **Creative Schools Week**

Muckross had its very first Creative Schools Week this week, thanks to Ms Keane and her committee. It was a huge success, encompassing everything from meditation, to craft workshops, lunchtime concerts by both staff and students, music quizzes, intercom artist of the day announcements, inputs by writer Denise Deegan and artists Niamh Lawlor and Mirjam Keune, an art competition and the most amazing culmination - a colour run and colour explosion.





## **Creative Schools- Sugar Craft**

All Transition Year and 1st year students participated in cupcake decorating activities on Monday in the canteen under the careful eyes of Ms S Doyle and Ms O'Reilly, who organised the events. Students brought in cupcakes and got creative using coloured fondants and decorations. Each student had 40 minutes to decorate their cupcake according to the theme, 'Muckross'. After a tough competition, the four winners were Faye Hession Jordan, Penny Maloney, Heidi Groarke and Anna Sheehan. They created really innovative designs, including Penny's 'Muckross Girl Cupcake', a huge favourite! First year students, with Ms Doyle's help, also created stained glass cookies. They all had a blast thanks to Ms O'Reilly and Ms Doyle. Edible art - what's not to like?

#### **Creative Schools- Workshops**

One of the most heart-warming aspects of Creative School's Week was how many students volunteered to get involved, either as performers or by running workshops. While we had some workshops directed by adults, there were also a number of workshops meticulously prepared for and presented by students, such as the jewellery and henna workshops. Ruby Pentony and Jessica Flynn organised a lunchtime jewellery workshop which they held in the library. The girls are very talented makers and shared their skills with students from all year groups, and each participant was facilitated to make their own pair of earrings.



Third year, Suha Alraqui, trained Grace Kennedy, Tess Delahunty, Naomi Ni Dhuibhir and Alice de Chaumont and they were joined by Maliha Zaman in creating henna designs. The girls practised for weeks ahead of the event and designed a range of motifs that their clients could choose from. Ms Keane is so proud of them and the care and attention they brought to their beautiful work.



There were also workshops facilitated by adults. Denise Deegan, an Irish writer of Young Adult fiction did an interactive creative writing workshop with the Fifth Years, which was hosted by Ms O'Grady in the library. Ms Deegan touched on themes such as building story-telling confidence, character development and the use of all the senses to embellish stories. Ms O'Grady also kindly donated the raw materials for Mirjam Keune's

(Creative Schools) workshop on book art with third year students, with beautiful results. Our own past pupil, Niamh Lawlor, facilitated both finger puppetry and a Spanish and Art cross-curricular puppetry workshop. The students learnt about animation and bringing their puppets to life using gentle movements and gestures. The art students had made beautiful puppets in art class during the year. The Spanish students then used these puppets to act out a piece of Spanish dialogue. Some used their wonderful CBAs, which they had spent so long perfecting and practising. It was a fun way of mixing art and Spanish and many thanks to the wonderful artist Niamh Lawlor, who so enthusiastically guided them along, and to Ms Donaghy and Ms Keane, who dreamt up the idea in the first place.

# **Creative Schools - Lunchtime performances**

The inimitable Ms Cunningham encouraged students and staff to take part in lunchtime performances that were greeted with wild applause. Some took place on the concourse, with students seated on the ground and ringing the balconies of the floors higher up. Some took place outside, including a concert by staff, who showed off some of their fancy footwork and sensational singing.



### **Creative Schools - Food For Thought**

And of course, no talk about food is complete without a feast. The Galway oysters, a completely sustainable food, were a source of fascination for students as they egged each other on to try them but there was plenty more on offer.

There was a special assembly to honour the winners of our Art Competition, and first year Penny Maloney was cheered to the rafters when she explained her painting, which won first prize. Ms Kelly instituted a new prize, the (Acting) Principal prize, for Tess Delahunty's lovely image of a dog, which did not quite meet the parameters of the competition but was exceptional, nonetheless.
