




Day 3: After a well needed sleep, that was cut short by Mr. Haughey and Mr. Curran, the lads waddled up to the baby slopes with their shins beginning to feel the pain that would only increase as the week went on. The sun was shining brightly down on the lads who were very quickly regretting putting on that extra layer! Every hour we improved our skills and graduated from the baby slopes onto bigger and better things. After the second session the lads returned to the hotel where they continued to chat to the girls who were also on a trip, desperately trying to win their attention. That night we all headed down to the local pizzeria where we devoured gorgeous pizzas after a day of heavy activity.

Day 4 and 5: The lads woke filled with excitement after certain promises made by their instructors involved chair lifts and red slopes. Unfortunately, it was back on the green slopes in the morning due to the ice but after a small rest, most groups were allowed to head up to the top of the mountain. The lads took inspiration from their mums on holiday, taking photos every two minutes as they got higher into the mountains. With our confidence growing each hour we tackled the challenging red slopes and showed off the skills we had developed over the previous few days. That night the lads had a quiz spanning six rounds with the winners getting free pizza from the teachers the next day. After long and well fought rounds the winners were crowned! Day five followed a similar pattern to the day before. However, that evening we took part in a basketball tournament. There was heavy competition from all, even after the long day on the slopes! After we were all ready for bed, exhausted after the day's activities.



Day 6: Day six began with a little more competition. Our instructors came up with a race which consisted of the lads weaving tightly in between poles placed at intervals down the green slope before passing through the finish line. We could ski faster and were able to do a few small jumps. After arguably the greatest session of skiing, the lads headed back to the hotel for food before ice skating. School Trips: Chemistry Trip

After months of anticipation, twenty-five Sixth Year Chemistry students embarked on a trip to Berlin from the 8th to the 10th of November 2023. This was an opportunity to get a hands-on experience with specialised equipment on the Leaving Cert course in a fully functioning lab while also experiencing the rich and complex history and culture of Berlin. Thanks to the meticulous planning of Mr. Hanley, Mr. Clancy, and Ms. Donnelly, we managed to fit so much in to the three days and make the trip truly memorable.

Our journey started at 3am in Dublin Terminal 2 where Mr. Hanley appeared more awake than the rest of us combined. However, as we navigated the airport and eventually touched down in Berlin, any lingering tiredness was gone. There was no waiting around once we reached our hotel in the city centre. We ditched our bags and hit the streets of Berlin where we mastered the metro system (eventually) and visited incredible historical sites. After a break for lunch in Alexander Platz where some tasted local German dishes (and the less adventurous had Burger King and Five Guys) we experienced many scientific exhibitions in the Futurium Museum.

After a rejuvenating night's sleep, we hit the road early the next morning. With the teachers' navigational skills, we managed to explore Berlin, including stops at the Palace of Tears, Topography of Terror, Checkpoint Charlie, and The Holocaust Memorial all before 2pm! Then we had the main event of the trip: a 4-hour chemistry demonstration where we learned about the synthesis of caffeine from various products. We all had an opportunity to work at different stations and use different expensive instrumentation and analytical techniques. The demonstration was both useful for the Leaving Cert Syllabus but also gave us an insight into a career in Chemistry. Afterwards we all took part in a number of competitive rounds of bowling!

Organizing and taking twenty-five lads on a trip through a city as busy as Berlin is no easy feat, and we all thank the thoughtful planning and cool headedness of Mr. Hanley, Mr. Clancy and Ms. Donnelly who made the trip as engaging and unforgettable as it was.




The Merchant of Venice

Nearly Zero Energy Building

The boys really enjoyed the day and got the opportunity to use virtual reality headsets to complete some of the tasks involved in insulating, air tightening and ventilating a NZEB home. Thanks to Mount Lucas for delivering the training day which provided an excellent insight into energy building/Retrofit for our Construction Studies students.



LGBTQ+ Quality Mark

In September 2022, 57 schools embarked on an 18 month journey to become an accredited LGBTQ+ safe and supportive school. On Friday 23rd February 2024, 37 schools gathered in Google to be presented with their hard-earned LGBTQ+ Quality Mark by James Kavanagh. Considering there are approximately 730 secondary schools in Ireland, the fact that St. Benildus College is one of the first schools in the country to become accredited is a huge achievement.

The Q-Mark initiative is run by Belong To, Ireland's leading youth LGBTQ+ charity. They provided us with a comprehensive list of requirements needed in order for us to develop as an LGBTQ+ safe and supportive school. Some of the things we did include.

- Ensuring that staff are equipped to support LGBTQ+ students. We had two training sessions to facilitate this, both of which were met with overwhelming support.
- Creating a supportive LGBTQ+ inclusive school culture and environment. We run a successful GSA (Gay, Straight Alliance) club every week. The Senior Hurling team also have pride bands on the arms of their T-shirts. We hope to include this pride band on more and more jerseys in the coming years
- We encouraged students to share their opinions and ideas on how to create a safe and supportive school. This was done through whole school surveys and also smaller focus groups.
- Developing and implementing school policies and plans. All relevant policies were updated to include LGBTQ+ language
- Implementing a curriculum that supports diversity and respect
- Working with parents, community organisations and other local LGBTQ+ youth projects to promote LGBTQ+ inclusion.

In Ireland, 76% of LGBTQ+ students do not feel safe at school. However, research shows that effective school-based interventions can improve the lives and experiences of LGBTQ+ students. We believe that the Quality Mark is a major step in allowing all students to feel safe and supported within our school. A big thank you to Ms. Lloyd, Mr. Hanley, and Mr. Clancy for their work and involvement in this achievement.







Prefects

The opportunity to become a prefect in Fifth Year was met with great enthusiasm by many students. Most of the boys were eager to be a more responsible member of the school community and get the opportunity to be a role model for the younger years. After the dauntingly formal interview process, we were awarded our prefect pins and were hopeful for the role we would play in the school. 
